


Why choose Birtenshaw College?

Birtenshaw College offers adults between the ages of 16 to 25, who may find it difficult to access mainstream college courses due to the level of support they require or the challenges of the environment, a unique opportunity to access education and training to suit their individual needs.

We offer care and support to young adults with a moderate to severe learning disability and/or complex health needs, in conjunction with:

- Autistic Spectrum Disorder
- Communication difficulties
- Multi-sensory impairment
- Significant medical conditions
- Physical impairment






What do learners say about Birtenshaw College?

I am more independent. I can now go on the bus, train and tram on my own. (Haydn)



Curriculum

Most learners attend College three days each week and each learner follows the curriculum pathway best suited to their needs and aspirations, as stated in their Education and Health Care Plans (EHCPs):



Learning for Life Pathway

(Pre-Entry M4-M8 / Entry Level 1, 2 and 3)

Progression Focus: communication, increased independence and development of employability skills for voluntary work.



Employability Pathway

(Entry Level 1 – Level 2)

Communication and Choice Pathway

(Pre-Entry M1-M4)

Progression Focus: developing communication, life skills and the ability to make choices.



Progression Focus: increased independence and preparation for paid employment.

The curriculum is based on the Preparing for Adulthood (PfA) outcomes:

- Employment
- Independent Living
- · Friends, Relationships and Community


His spoken communication has definitely improved and he is keen to try new words.

Work Experience

Work experience is an opportunity to introduce young people to the world of work, and layer up the skills needed to help them into employment in the future. We believe that, through effective partnership working, the barriers that currently prevent young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) from accessing work experience, can be broken down to ensure that lives can be changed – one experience at a time.

Birtenshaw College has achieved Fair Train's **Work Experience Quality Standard at Gold level.**

Facilities

Birtenshaw College is a fully accessible and autism-friendly college for young adults with SEND, providing a calm environment through low stimulus décor and lighting, safe indoor and outdoor sensory spaces and independent work rooms.



We are also able to regularly access the hydrotherapy pool at the nearby Birtenshaw



The college is set in spacious grounds which provide for land-based activities, with a smallholding providing opportunity for outdoor learning through horticulture, animal care, habitat management and small-scale woodwork.



The college is securely fenced and has security doors throughout the entire building.


